Welcome to Mrs Tregear!




We would like to formally welcome Mrs Tregear as the new Headteacher of Little Reddings Primary School. It

Joint Governors Training across and Beyond the Bushey St James Trust



The expertise that exists within the BSJT is not only improving the life chances for students within the three schools in our Multi Academy Trust, but is also continuing to influence many local schools in the area.

Earlier this term over 40
Governors from four different institutions, including key
Governors from Falconers School in Bushey, gathered for an excellent Safeguarding Training session led by experienced Deputy Headteacher and Designated Safeguarding Lead Mrs Ash.

Having worked in a number of schools in different settings in North London and Hertfordshire and having been involved in school leadership at a senior level for nearly 20 years, her expertise was invaluable in the room. She promoted lots of discussion around the tables and answered all the Governors' questions after giving an excellent presentation which outlined all the key and

important aspects of the 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' agenda. Many of the Governors present provided much positive feedback and expressed their desire to connect in with the Bushey St James Trust MAT more in the future - working together to share best practice and support the ongoing school improvement journeys in all of our schools.

Feedback across the BSJT

Starting at BMS as an Assistant Headteacher in January was a surprisingly easy thing to do. Made so by the supportive staff and positive atmosphere into which I was transferring. As a professional opportunity to develop my role of overseeing the curriculum I was fortunate enough to regularly visit Little Reddings and Hartsbourne Primary Schools. Visits that provided me with invaluable knowledge on the holistic educational experience that the BSJT provides for its students. The primaries shared with me a range of subjects from English, Science and Maths to History. The student enthusiasm for learning was impressive, as was their ability to express themselves orally and in writing. I learned how to measure gas in a Year 6 Science lesson and was pleasantly surprised at the student's ability to plan experiments and identify

the scientific skills that they were utilising in the process. In the same way, on visiting a Year 7 English lesson during which they debated symbolism, the level of formality and articulation of opinions was astonishingly refined for their age. However, it was the friendly, family-orientated atmosphere of these schools that ultimately stood out and it was this that fostered the impressive learning experiences that I witnessed over my time at both Little Reddings and Hartsbourne Primary School.

After completing this section of visits, as I hope to return, I have been able to reflect on and review the curriculum stretching from Year 1 to Year 13 and vitally, contextualise the Year 6 to Year 7 transition from primary to secondary school. An insight into the curriculum that will ensure we successfully sequence student learning and share best practices across the Trust.

Dance across the BSJT

Unlike most schools across the country who are cutting back their curriculum offer in arts subjects, Bushey Meads School continues to offer an eclectic curriculum offer across the arts including dance at both GCSE and A Level and runs a thriving dance department for the benefit of all students across our Trust. The subject of dance allows our students to explore a range of styles with a heavy focus on both performance and choreography.



In both the A Level and GCSE courses, students are required to choreograph solo dance works, perform set choreography and



collectively choreograph group pieces. Not only does dance help you maintain a healthy lifestyle and push your physical boundaries, it also allows you to develop future life skills including teamwork, communication, self-discipline and leadership. Students learn in a fantastic and supportive environment, focused on developing artistic excellence, intellectual curiosity and creative mindset. The BSJT Multi Trust Dance Company has now expanded from previous years; rather than one club aimed for Key Stage 3, the Dance Department have created two separate companies. A Youth Company for students in Key Stage 3 as well as Year 5 and 6 pupils from Hartsbourne and Little Reddings Primary Schools and the addition of a Senior Company which includes students from Key Stage 4 and 5. The companies have been working on creating their own choreography as well as learning challenging set pieces taught by GCSE students, Miss Noyan and Miss Dolan.

During this term the students had been preparing for a Dance **Showcase Evening** Performance which was due to take place on Thursday 2nd April. This will now be re-scheduled for a later date and will showcase the works the Multi Trust Dance Company groups have learnt and created alongside GCSE and A Level assessment pieces. The evening performance is sure to display the talent and creativity of our students here at BMS as well as at Hartsbourne and Little Reddings. about Spring festivals - made daffodil cards for St David's Day, marble painting rainbow pictures for Holi and tasted Hamentashen for Purim.




Two families are expecting babies and with the assistance of Mrs Bowyer (the Childcare teacher at Bushey Meads) we have been supporting transitions by playing 'looking after babies'. Mrs Bowyer has a record of achieving outstanding results with our KS4 and KS5 Childcare students and, speaking of her unique dual experience, allowing her to also work with the 'little ones' at the nursery, she said the following: Over the course of this year, it has been a pleasure to spend an afternoon each week working alongside the fantastic staff at Little Gems. During my time in the nursery, I have seen the children participating in a wide range of different activities that have supported all areas of their learning and development. These have ranged from playing bingo developing social skills and teamwork, to dressing up building on speech and language and imagination. I recently donated some dressing up clothes to the nursery, and we had a great afternoon watching the children act out as Batman, Mermaids and Pirates. The children got so much joy out of the activity and used their speech and language skills to interpret their characters. After this first occasion, it led into

'World Book Day'. The children all dressed up for the day as different characters from children's stories, and enjoyed a day of fun activities. It is such a privilege to be able to contribute to the great learning environment that has been created for the youngest members of our Trust.

BJST Design and Technology

As a Trust, we are privileged to have teachers who work across our schools. Mrs Hewitt, delivers the majority of her Design and Technology lessons at Bushey Meads but, with her wider ranging experience, she also delivers lessons and projects to primary school children in our Trust. Here are some of the highlights from this year. In the Autumn term, at Bushey Meads,





Year 9 completed their cooking and nutrition topic and learned to make a range of sweet and savoury dishes. At the end of the topic they wanted to share their own recipes and each decided to bring in a dish for the class to try that they had made at home. They enjoyed tasting each other's dishes and swapping recipes that they could then try at home. At Hartsbourne, Year 2 learned about the different food groups and how important it is to eat 5



portions of fruits and vegetables each day. They designed and made their own fruit smoothies in pairs after lots of taste testing.



Year 3 made winter celebration decorations. They began by choosing which celebration they wanted to create a decoration for and then they tested materials to see what properties they wanted for their decorations. Their tests included folding, water resistance, abrasion and marking. This term, at Hartsbourne, we have continued to develop the design and technology curriculum in Key Stage 2. In Year 6, they have been designing recipes and making bread. The children began with a simple bread recipe and chose which flavours they would like to add to their dough. Together they created a range of different flavour combinations to try in a taste test. After completing their taste test they then picked their favourite recipe and created a bread roll with a unique shape. In Year 4, the children have been learning about electronics and

linking their science learning with technology. First they began by identifying which materials would be suitable conductors and insulators. Using this knowledge, they chose appropriate materials for making a torch. They used soldering irons and a range of components, including switches they had made themselves, to create a circuit and placed this inside the torch casing. Thank you to Mrs Hewitt for providing these wonderful Design and Technology opportunities for our students across the Trust.

On Thursday 13th February Ms Raquel Abeledo (MFL lead at Hartsbourne) spent a day at Bushey Meads observing lessons and meeting with MFL teachers. Ms Abeledo gained an insight into many new MFL activities and said she looks forward to further collaboration with the MFL Faculty here at BMS.

Science Week at LRS

One of the highlights of this term at Little Reddings was their very successful Science Week; a very busy week during which the children thoroughly enjoyed celebrating British Science Week. It was absolutely fantastic to see the children developing their 'working scientifically' skills during a science carousel morning on the Thursday of Science Week. This gave the children the opportunity to work with a variety of teachers to conduct a range of different experiments. In EYFS the children were using eggs and rolling them on different surfaces, and in Nursery, the children created dancing raisins using lemonade.

Some of the children's questions challenged the teachers to think more about how our world works!

Across KS1 there was a sensory activity, a germs investigation and an experiment posing the hypothesis: How does water absorb colour from paper? Further up in the school, in Years 3 and 4, the children explored gravity, space, motion and electrical circuits. The children were asking excellent questions showing a depth of knowledge about different topics. The teachers noticed that the children were using scientific vocabulary in their discussions, something we are really trying to push for in the science department at LRS. Upper KS2 took on the challenge of separating oil from water, this sent a powerful message about how we need to take greater care of our oceans and look for ways to reduce oil pollution.



In Rowling class there were a range of different activities set up to explore surface tension and gravity. They found that a balloon will pop if you prick it with a needle but will often maintain its shape if you put some sticky tape on it and pass the needle through the tape. It was also interesting to find out that you can stop a

person from getting out of their chair by the simple act of placing a thumb on their forehead in a particular way. Many of the children have commented on how enjoyable science week was and some of their questions have challenged the teachers to think more about how our world works!





Science Fair at LRS

Little Reddings School finished their Science Week celebrations by hosting a Science Fair on Friday 13th March. Children across the school entered investigations and experiments which were show-cased on Friday afternoon to all the staff, children and parents. Lots of children brought in investigations they had completed at home with their families. Some children did investigations in school including using food colouring to see how a plant takes in water, as well as discovering the differences in how far a car will travel on different surfaces. During the Science Fair the children presented a variety of experiments from erupting volcanoes, the conduction of





electricity, exploring if moons have oceans and the spread of bacteria by looking at how mould grows on bread.

We thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon and it was very exciting to hear the children talk about their learning.

This was a day that will be well remembered by all! It was such a great way to end the week and so many children presented such superb experiments.





Pupils were able to follow their curiosity and interests which was fantastic to see. We had a huge number of entries and ended the afternoon by giving out lots of prizes - Miss Jalkhi & Miss Squires found it very difficult to pick the winners. This was a day that will be well remembered by all the staff and children because of all the excitement and learning it provided. Thank you to all those children who entered.



The Journey from Primary School to University

With the A level examinations this year being cancelled it has been an anxious time for our Year 13 students at Bushey Meads School. Students applying for a place at University had to submit their application by 15th January, after which, the offers start to come through.

Each student can apply for up to 5 university courses and then, if they are lucky enough to secure an offer of a place, they decide which their firm choice is and which their insurance choice is. The process for students gaining their grades this year is very different with the students not sitting their terminal examinations. The Department for Education is sending out guidance to schools at some point in April so the students can still be certificated and awarded appropriate grades, enabling them to move onto their next learning journey, whether that be a university course, apprenticeship or starting employment.

It is particularly nice to track the students who started their school journey at our Trust primary schools. The following Year 13 students attended Little Reddings Primary School and have applied to study the following courses at a university next year:


There's still plenty of learning going on as teachers upload work to our website and our You Tube channel Hartsbourne Reads will go live this Friday!
