WHAT YOU SAID	WHAT WE'RE DOING
More sports/different sports/all children swimming	The curriculum includes hockey, rugby, football, tennis, netball, basketball, rounders, gymnastics and athletics. We try and include things like archery or golf through Y6 residential trip, Y4 orienteering and other clubs and trips.
	In the past, parents have not wanted to pay for the coach to transport children to the pool, but now that we have a mini bus we will be re-introducing swimming for upper KS2 next term.
More school trips/annual outing	Many parents did comment positively on the new enrichment programme which plans for a minimum of one enrichment activity per term per year group. Teachers plan in others as time and the curriculum allows bearing in mind not all parents are able to pri- oritise costly coach and entrance fees.
More clubs at lunch times More time to eat at lunchtimes	We try and provide as many clubs as we can, however we also have to juggle three lunch sittings and only 1 hall and 1 playground large enough to accommodate a club and chil- dren not in the club. We will try and include some other clubs for next term. We have 1 hour and 5 minutes to get 210 children through lunch and some to attend a club, lengthening the lunch hour would have an impact on learning (shorter teaching time) and staff costs.
Lollipop and zebra crossings, park- ing	We have applied twice to the Council for a zebra crossing but they tell us the footfall and car count in Hartsbourne Road is not high enough to warrant one. Schools have no jurisdiction over parking or driving and we encourage everyone to act responsibly around the school; '20 is plenty' is a good approach. All complaints about parking should be directed to the Council or police.
More Parents' evenings, more opportunities to discuss things	There is a parent consultation evening in the autumn and spring term and the written report in the summer term takes the place of the meeting. If you require more time please don't hesitate to make an appointment with the class teacher in the usual way.

WHAT YOU SAID	WHAT WE'RE DOING
More teacher comments in books to encourage children	Our policy (on the website) calls for more developmental and next step marking rather than too many generic terms such as 'well done', however we will be trialing a more positive marking sys- tem this term in Y5 and we will review the policy at the end of the trial. We will circulate any changes in due course.
The website was updated	We agree this is an area of improvement for us and we will be working on the website this term ready for September. Please let us know if there are any particular pieces of information you would like although bear in mind the new GDPR code of practice is much stricter about data and pupil photos.
Should cover more die- tary requirements	Caterlink Ltd are our school meal providers and offer 3 meal options, hot and cold vegetables and cater for a range of food allergies . As a non-denominational school we are unable to offer more specific (religious) dietary requirements.
Communication could be better	Please just drop us an e mail with where you think communication could be improved and we will do our very best to make adjustments. It is our policy to respond to e mails within 48 hours, there is a member of staff on duty every morning on the playground and Mrs Hudson will meet with parents without an appointment if she is free to do so. We give a minimum of two weeks notice for trips, all dates are published in the weekly Newsletter and teachers run a weekly blog on the website.
More use of the nature reserve, more school gar- den equipment	The nature reserve has been improved over the last year and staff are building in more opportu- nities for using this wonderful resource. 'Gardening' is not something children do on a regular basis in school but please let us know exactly what you think we need and we will try and get it.
Separate changing for boys and girls	The school was not built with any changing facilities at all so we use the classrooms. Children must be supervised while changing so it would be quite a large adjustment to our timetables to find staff to supervise separate changing even if we used the Hall. Providing children are wearing suitable under wear (eg a vest) they are no less covered than on the beach. Older girls could put their shorts on at home under their dress or trousers on PE days.
Students played a differ- ent instrument to djembe	We are very pleased to tell you that from September we will be employing a specialist music teacher from Bushey Meads who will broaden the range of music teaching the children have access to.
Fix the leak in the roof	We are trying I promise you! Unfortunately, roof repairs are complicated and costly. We are currently monitoring the last set of repairs before replacing the tile in the dining room.
More stay and play and If there was a nursery	We would love a nursery unfortunately the local authority set the amount of nursery places for the area and they have said there is enough places. We could open a private nursery on the site but would need raise funds for building an extension or a portable classroom.
A class pet to teach re- sponsibility	Pets are a BIG responsibility and would need to be cared for during holidays and over weekends. Due to the prevalence of foxes in the area it would be difficult to keep chickens or rabbits outside. However we will try and build in more opportunities to give children responsibilities in other areas of school life.
Enforced the drop-off	We will try and monitor drop off more closely to ensure everyone follows the rules for the safety
Offered mindfulness dur- ing school Everyone should be treat-	We take children's mental health very seriously and we will be reviewing and updating our PSHE Policy this term especially in the light of the government's new legislation with regard to relation- ship education for primary schools.

BEFORE SCHOOL

Please can I remind you that children should wait quietly with their adult before school and not run around in the playgrounds, on banks, in the astro turf or using the play equipment. The morning playground is too busy with others for children to be able to play safely at this time. It is so much better if they enter the classroom calm and ready to learn.

Year 3 parents should wait at the bottom of the steps (on the KS2 playground) and Year 4 should wait near the emergency gates. This helps to keep the paths free for parents with prams and pushchairs.
