Last month all parents of children currently in Year 6 received information about their child's secondary school allocation for September. This year again there were nearly 1000 applications for the 200 sought after places at Bushey Meads School for Year 7 students. In terms of popularity this places Bushey Meads firmly in the top 10 of secondary schools across the whole county of Hertfordshire.

The popular parents' website Schools Guru describes Bushey Meads School as 'one of Hertfordshire's hottest secondary schools, attracting more applicants than any others in the county in 2019!'

As one of the 'most wanted' secondary schools in 2019 we attracted nearly 5 applicants per available place. In addition our first preferences are now up 20% and our second preferences are up 15% from 2014.

We have also noted a big increase in applications from our BSJT feeder primary schools, reflecting the continuing great work across the three schools within our innovative Multi Academy Trust. This will inevitably ensure an even better and smoother transition process as we continue to work together to ensure that all students achieve their true potential at every level of their educational journey through the Bushey St James Trust. Nearly 90 siblings have been allocated places – a strong indication that families are very happy with the educational provision at Bushey Meads and, if their older children are already at

the school, they want their younger children to join them. An increasing number of children of staff are also gaining places at the school which shows their belief and faith in the strong and inclusive culture and family atmosphere established at Bushey Meads.

Finally our catchment area is now less than 1.9 kilometres, again reflecting our continued outstanding success and genuine desire to be a real school of choice for our local community. Exciting times!

Maths across the Trust

I work as a Key Stage 2 and 3 Mathematics teacher across the BSJT and work at Bushey Meads and Hartsbourne Primary School. It is a privilege to work across the Trust and I thoroughly enjoy teaching Mathematics to young minds!

At Bushey Meads, I teach an enriched curriculum to Year 7s and 8s; delivering mathematics to students in an exciting and engaging manner, helping to encourage them to reach their full potential. I impart my knowledge



and passion of Mathematics to young minds, linking the subject to their world and other subjects across Bushey Meads. Every Tuesday and Wednesday I embark on my journey to Hartsbourne where I teach their most able students. I work in small groups of four from:

Year 2: Alex, Ruben, Olly and Emma, Year 4: Robbie, Henry, Jessica and Thasanmee and Year 5: Adam, Jheel, Fin and Druv. These young Mathematicans have both passion and curiosity; they



love to explore the subject and really enjoy learning new topics. Every week I work alongside their curriculum and extend their understanding by getting the Year 2's to do more complex problems and even attempt KS3 material. The Year 4 & 5's work on the K33 curriculum but are often pushed to their boundaries and attempt GCSE questions. We also play Maths games related to their topics, which they thoroughly enjoy.

As part of a 'Cross Phase Project', our Maths departments have been working closely to provide exciting and engaging Maths opportunities for many of our KS2 pupils at Little Reddings. The fundamental aim; to inspire and enthuse pupils with a wider range of problem solving activities including: Logo coding, spiral creations, tower of Hanoi, Ken Ken, Sudoko and shape creations using polydron sets.

The sessions have been organised and overseen by Mr Wells and Mr Kazsa, but have been delivered and facilitated by two of our

We have seen a positive shift in children's attitude towards mathematics, through the activities that they are taking part in. All of the children who have attended are developing their problem solving skills, persevering with challenging tasks, in turn increasing their

Key Stage 2 -3 Maths Links

Over the past term, I have been working across the BSJT teaching mathematics to Years 6 - 11. At Bushey Meads School, I have enjoyed teaching across Key Stages 3 and 4, adapting my teaching style to suit different year groups. I feel one of my key strengths has been applying my knowledge and experience of Year 6 maths to help students in Year 7 build on their prior knowledge. Having a sound understanding of the curriculum content of Key Stage 2 has helped me scaffold work for my Year 7 class and use the Key Stage 2 mastery approach to provide stretch and challenge activities for the students. I recently attended a course with the Head of Maths from Little Reddings Primary School, Mr Wells, at Sandringham School on supportive transition from Year 6 to Year 7, where we discussed using misconceptions effectively and teaching towards gaps in knowledge. Mr Wells and I discussed what we could do as a Trust to further support transition and minimise repetition of taught maths knowledge and skills between Year 6 and Year 7. It has also been a pleasure to have allocated teaching hours at one of our partner primary schools -Little Reddings. I have been teaching groups of Year 6 children in order to help prepare them for their upcoming SATs tests. The school use a fantastic resource called PiXL, which has aided communication between myself and the school. I have set up therapy groups for the children with whom I am working, which allows me to; identify gaps from previous assessments: update the progress tracker following lessons so the school can monitor the



children's progress: return to objectives following ongoing assessments. I also use pupil voice to inform teaching objectives, for example, one group of children said they were unsure how pie charts worked, so the following week we linked pie charts to they are motivated to achieve the given objective. I am looking forward to supporting both schools through upcoming summative assessments and wish all my students the best of luck! Hannah Wells KS2-3 Maths Teacher

Brand new computer and internet monitoring tools have also come in to effect to ensure that students can access

IT Update across the BSJT...

The Bushey Meads website continues to improve with greater ease of access and faster load times across all pages. An entire overhaul of the content available has occurred over the past few months. Many new pages have been added, layout improvements have been made to existing pages, and a focus has been made on showcasing the very best of Bushey Meads. One such area is our highly successful student leadership programme, with many students taking part in a series of videos explaining their role within the school as a student leader.



In addition to this, a bank of new Chromebooks have been purchased for use by students in Years 5 and 6, providing a new style of accessible learning. This further smooths the transition from primary to secondary with Bushey Meads frequently using





High Tech Mac Suites in Art and Media at Bushey Meads School

Further improvements have been made with the creation of a Mac suite in our recently extended art block, this provides the students with an industry standard space for photo and video editing, with a similar spec to what they will experience in the world of work. This addition means there is now two specifically designed Mac suites in the Performing and Visual Arts department. Little Reddings have recently had the last of their old interactive boards replaced with state of the art modern touch displays, now every class has access to the full range of interactive utilities that come as standard on these style of boards.

Chromebooks as a learning resource in lessons, a tool the students will now already be fully familiarised with by the time they move to Year 7. Hartsbourne Primary gained a bank of Windows 10 laptops for students to use in lessons. These provide greater mobility in class, allowing students to work in groups of different sizes and learning styles not accessible with traditional static PC's. In addition to this, an entire rewire of all the network cables took place to a much more current standard. These new cables provide a faster internet speed and have a longer lifespan than the cables in place before.





Joint Governor Training

One of the clear benefits of working within the setting of a Multi Academy Trust is that of being able to share training opportunities across our three schools. One such opportunity took place in March of this year when we gathered together as staff and Governors to learn about the important subject of handling complaints in line with Department for Education policy and practice. It was a chance for us to check our clear systems and procedures and ensure that we were following all appropriate guidelines across our three institutions. It was also another opportunity for Governors to get to know each other and share best practice.

KS2/KS3 Design and Technology Links across the BSJT

Miss Hewitt (one of our six recently appointed KS2 -3 specialists teachers) has been working effectively across two of our Trust schools this term -**Bushey Meads and Little Reddings** Primary School. She has been having a big impact in providing our students with some superb opportunities to extend their learning in a key curriculum area - Design and Technology. In Year 3, the children have been learning about the Romans and how their history has impacted our lives today. As part of this topic, the children designed and made their own Roman chariots. They started by creating a design brief to help them understand what the purpose of a chariot was. Year 3 then looked at a range of moving vehicles to try and work out how the given examples moved using different language with Ms Moses. Recently, they have been learning new vocabulary to describe the mechanisms, they then used diagrams and pictures to explain how they worked. Using what they had learnt about other moving vehicles, the

children then began to construct their own. They worked safely to use the junior hacksaws, glue guns and hand drill. When they had finished, they raced their chariots in the hall to decide who their champion was.

In Year 5, the children have been developing their knowledge of the French language with Ms Moses. Recently, they have been learning new vocabulary to describe the rooms in a house. As part of this topic they have started to make a







model house which they will then label with the appropriate vocabulary. In addition to this, they have started to create an electronic quiz which will be used as a resource to revise the vocabulary about rooms in a house.

At the beginning of the project, they worked well in pairs to decide between insulators and conductors to help them with creating an electronic circuit. After, they made their own multiple choice question cards. When the correct answer is selected, the light in the circuit would then flash red.

Creative writing and the skills of English have been my area of focus at Little Reddings. Contextualising learning is essential as it allows students to adopt a variety of learning styles and approaches to each lesson. Prior to shared reading, students explored props from Neil Gaiman's 'Instructions' to support them in making predictions and enabled them to generate pertinent questions relating to the origins and purpose of these objects. Subsequently, students wrote their own instructional journeys through a magical realm. Establishing links between the students across the trust is a priority; thus, Year 8 students at **Bushey Meads School have** written letters to Year 6 students at Hartsbourne and Little Reddings to help them prepare for their impending SATs. By extension, preparations are underway for the upcoming spelling and grammar competition that will include students from all three schools. **Gary Johnson**

As collaboration continues to grow and thrive across our partnership of schools, we are excited to implement a small part of our vision for music across the Trust. Maths across the BSJT

It could be argued that some of the greatest scientific and mathematical discoveries to grace the Earth have already been achieved; however, looking out onto the Hartsbourne dining room on an average lunch time I would question that belief. Sat around an innocuous looking white board, children of all abilities are contemplating this week's maths challenge; building on their love of maths to better themselves and take pride in solving a problem that they may not have felt they could achieve at the start

of the year. These children are the future and before anything, we want to develop a sense of pride in their work and an open mindset for learning.

The weekly maths challenge is just one of the ways we at Hartsbourne are striving to remove maths anxiety in children and increase their chances of reaching their full potential. This year Hartsbourne invested in new maths planning (Essential Maths from HFL) which has been well received by staff and children. Our lesson plans allow pupils to self-differentiate and our Learning Gems programme allows them to be comfortable with mistakes and encourages resilience in the face of adversity.

And why shouldn't they love maths?

In addition to this we have worked hard this year to change the perception some people have, of maths being either something you are good at or not. At some time, many of us have heard comments such as "I was never any good at maths" or "you don't need it in real life anyway, I have a calculator on my phone." However, through initiatives with Bushey Meads, Hartsbourne has been able to give children opportunities to challenge their perceptions, such as Mathletics competitions; lessons with a secondary teacher (for high attaining pupils) and representing the school in the Y5 maths team, Maths Monday events and



interactive displays. We want children to feel proud of the skills they do have, as Adam in Y5 said *"It was the first time I've been asked to represent the school and had a lot of fun."* Maths is a magical subject which can be seen in all aspects of our lives; art and crafts, nature, technology, music, geography and science. Just the other day I came across this quote: 'Maths can be related to our lives; it teaches us to always be careful with the signs...'

Languages across the BSJT

Building houses and building sentences in French by Laura Moses

Recently, I came across an article on Teach Wire (written in 2007). It spoke about The UK's First National Writing Day (June 2017) and the importance of increasing pupils' motivation for writing. They went onto to explain the following:

'Around a third (30.3%) of KS2 students, half (52.6%) of KS3 students and two-thirds (63.1%) of KS4 students could be missing out on these benefits as they say they do not enjoy writing outside school.'

The situation above got me thinking about how KS2 and KS3 MFL learners feel about writing in a Modern Foreign Language. Would the results be similar to the results I read in the article? I would not be surprised if many pupils found this area of MFL hard, challenging and perhaps quite daunting. This got me thinking about how I could go about increasing writing motivation and enjoyment in MFL. This led to me to think about Big Write sessions in primary schools.



Big Write sessions are long writing sessions, which allow children time to write at length. These sessions are known to support writer motivation. I wondered if there was a way to draw upon this idea in MFL, as a way of increasing writing motivation. I am a firm believer that we must explore creativity in languages, so with this in mind I came up with the idea of building sentences and houses!

When I got to the part of the syllabus that looked at learning about rooms in a house, I had an idea about how I could put my



theory about creativity to the test. Once I had looked at the key vocabulary and structures, I asked Year 7 pupils to design a house out of junk materials. The only brief they were given was to label the rooms in French and research the names for the different things they put in each room. I am not sure what I expected the results to be. When the hand in date arrived, I was amazed by what I saw. Houses in all shapes and sizes. One house even has working lights and doorbell! It was very clear that a huge amount of time had gone into each house. Houses on desks, we were ready to write. We went through a model paragraph and completed a shared write. After this, it was time for pupils to have a go. With a scaffold on the board, they set out to write about the house that they had created. They began by saying what was on each level of the house, and they ended by describing what was in a particular room.

The differentiation happened automatically because some pupils just listed the rooms on a floor or each floor, but some pupils went into a lot more detail.

It depended on how much detail they had added to their house. In addition to this there was chance to review previous learning. For example, say where you live (using à) and using adjectives to describe size and colour. There was a real buzz in the classroom that day. All pupils were motivated to try to write their descriptions. Whether pupils wrote a couple of sentences or a whole paragraph,





primary pupils. My hope for my Year 7 language learners is that they can reflect of their Year 7 language journey in July 2019 and feel like a new world has been opened up for them. It is a true gift to be able to write in a different language, and I will continue to provide my students with French Big Write opportunities (always with a twist!) because I want them to continually develop their MFL writing motivation. This in turn will impact positively upon their writing attainment. I feel that for the next writing opportunity, I could gather ideas from pupils regarding what the twist should be.

it was about the motivation they had towards the writing task. A few weeks after creating these houses, I took the creations down to Little Reddings School because some of our pupils will be giving this task a go. They were very intrigued and taken with what the Bushey Meads pupils had done. The example houses that **Bushey Meads pupils created** have helped to generate some 'initial motivation' amongst my primary language learners, because they served as a point of entry for some work that I am going to be doing with them. I am excited to use the work of my Year 7 pupils to inspire my
